Recommended reads

As a school, we are always looking for ways to inspire a love of reading in the children. We have noticed that some of the children are so keen to read that they are filling in their reading records. Please do try and keep discussing their choices and asking questions about the text.

Here are a few questions to try:

Asking Questions about a book...

Choosing a book:

Why did you choose this book?

Did you like the picture on the front?

Have you read other books by this author?

Did you choose it because it is about ... (e.g. trains, cats)?

What could this book be about?

During the reading of the book:

Tell me what is happening in the pictures?

What has happened so far? Is it what you expected to happen?

What might happen next? How do you think the story might end?

What sort of character is....? Is he/she friendly/ mean/nice...?

Ask children about events in the story: How would you feel if you had been that character? Has anything like that happened to you? Would you like that to happen to you?

If reading an information book: What facts have you read? Have you learnt anything new? What does this page tell you about? Is there anything that interests you on this page?

Where would you go to find information about....?

At the end of the book:

What was your favourite part? Why?

What was the most interesting/ exciting part of the book? Can you find it?

What sort of character is....?

Why did that character do ... (give a situation/ event from the story)?

What happened in the story?

Are there any words that you don't understand or don't know what they mean?

Who are the main characters in the story? What character would you like to be?

Why are some words written in capital letters? Italics? Bold print? Different colour?

Would you like to read another story by this author or illustrator?

Have you read any other books like this one? Is it happy/sad/ scary/ exciting? Why do you think this?

Does this story remind you of anything that has happened to you?

Tell me about some other books that you have read recently.

Did you like this book? Why? (Encourage children to develop their opinion about books by encouraging them to explain their reasons)

Safeguarding at Slindon

What is safeguarding?

Visitors coming on to school premises, including the playground, have a duty of care towards the welfare and safety of the children and adults in the school. This is called safeguarding.

Safeguarding means that:

- · children are protected from maltreatment
- · a child's health or development is protected
- children grow up with safe and effective care
- action is taken to ensure the best outcomes for all children

Safeguarding is the action we take to promote the welfare of children in our care to protect them from harm. We take this responsibility very seriously and we work in close partnership with parents and professionals to protect all of our children. The school will take any reasonable action to ensure the welfare and safety of its pupils is maintained.

Our staff and governors have been trained on safeguarding in line with the KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE IN EDUCATION document and have taken part in 'PREVENT'.

School governor vacancy - Slindon CofE Primary School

Parent Governor vacancy

Being a school governor is a challenging but hugely rewarding role. It will give you the chance to make a real difference to young people, give something back to your local community and use and develop your skills in a board-level environment. As a governor you will be able to:

- Use your own experience of education and life beyond school to inform conversations
- Develop and utilise your skills in a board-level environment
- Make a valuable contribution to education and your community
- Support and challenge the school so that it improves for pupils and staff
- Bring your unique experiences, perspectives and insights in to decision-making in the interests of the school community

Governors set the aims and objectives for the school or group of schools and set the policies and targets for achieving those aims and objectives. They monitor and evaluate the progress the school is making and act as a source of challenge and support to the headteacher. In action, this means:

- Managing budgets and deciding how money is spent
- Engaging with pupils, staff, parents and the school community
- Sitting on panels and making decisions about things like pupil exclusions and staff disciplinary
- Addressing a range of education issues within the school including disadvantaged pupils, pupils with special needs, staff workload and teacher recruitment
- Looking at data and evidence to ask questions and have challenging conversations about the school
- Appointing and performance reviewing the head teacher and senior leaders, including making decisions about pay

Skills

Anyone aged over 18 can be a governor and you do not need to be a parent. There is no requirement for you to have an understanding of the education system, just the necessary skills, character and time to contribute. There is plenty of training available to help you learn about education.

Schools needs and benefit from a range of professional knowledge on their governing board including education, finance, human resources, legal, marketing and public relations, property and estates management, and organisational change.

It is also important that you have time to commit to the role. School governors typically attend 6-12 meetings per year, as well as making school visits and having background reading and training.

Other specific questions for school to answer

You will also need to undertake a DBS check with the school and pass all relevant disqualification checks.
