What's happening in school?

Goodwood Farm

Catkin Class had a very exciting trip this month where we visited Goodwood Farm near Chichester. The children were very enthusiastic during their time at the farm, and I was so impressed by the level of engagement and questions, it was great to see!

During our visit to the farm, we met many different animals including cows, sheep and pigs. The majority of the class enjoyed seeing the pigs the most. The farm was an insightful place to learn, for instance the children learnt about the stomach of a cow (they have four compartments!), how milk is taken from a cow, where it is then stored and how milk is sold in the local farm shop. The children could then explore the farm shop and see the milk in various products, including the cheese.

The children had a great time going on a nature walk around the grounds where they saw multiple tractors and a wide variety of trees. They learnt all about the different types, including which trees are evergreen and which are deciduous. This links with our current focus in science where we continue to explore seasons.

The children additionally took part in a small workshop where they looked at various crops (wheat and barley for instance) and how these are milled. Some of the children had the chance to do their very own milling and went on to explore how these are used in different products.

Houses of Parliament

On the 22nd November, Chestnut class braved the ice and snow to make the trip to London. After a slightly delayed start the children made a speedy walk down to the Houses of Parliament. On the way we took in the sights of Westminster Abbey, the Oliver Cromwell statue and the memorial to Emmaline Pankhurst.

Once at the Houses of Parliament, we were greeted by our tour guide Kai. Kai took us all around the House of Lords and House of Commons, where we watched a debate on the war in Ukraine, and told us many facts about the building and its beautiful decoration. We also got to visit the great hall, which was where Queen Elizabeth II lay in state and where Henry VIII was rumoured to have played tennis.

After our tour, we took part in a workshop about how the House of Lords and Commons works. The children had a fantastic time and became quite knowledgeable about the passing of laws.

Then we had a late lunch before setting off on our tour around London. We took in the sights of the Queen Elizabeth tower (Home of Big Ben), the Cenotaph, the women of war memorial, Horse Guards, Trafalgar Square, Admiralty Arch, The Mall, Churchill's war rooms, St James Park and finally Buckingham Palace. After a short rest at the Palace we then headed back to Victoria.

In Victoria there was a surprise for us, Santa Claus was driving a Morgan! The children got their photograph with Santa, before hopping on the train back to Barnham. After a long day, we all needed a rest and to warm up slightly. But, as usual, the children were a credit to the school.

- action is taken to ensure the best outcomes for all children

Safeguarding is the action we take to promote the welfare of children in our care to protect them from harm. We take this responsibility very seriously and we work in close partnership with parents and professionals to protect all of our children. The school will take any reasonable action to ensure the welfare and safety of its pupils is maintained.

Our staff and governors have been trained on safeguarding in line with the KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE IN EDUCATION document and have taken part in 'PREVENT'.

School governor vacancy - Slindon CofE Primary School

Parent Governor vacancy

Being a school governor is a challenging but hugely rewarding role. It will give you the chance to make a real difference to young people, give something back to your local community and use and develop your skills in a board-level environment. As a governor you will be able to:

- Use your own experience of education and life beyond school to inform conversations
- Develop and utilise your skills in a board-level environment
- Make a valuable contribution to education and your community
- Support and challenge the school so that it improves for pupils and staff
- Bring your unique experiences, perspectives and insights in to decision-making in the interests of the school community

Governors set the aims and objectives for the school or group of schools and set the policies and targets for achieving those aims and objectives. They monitor and evaluate the progress the school is making and act as a source of challenge and support to the headteacher. In action, this means:

- Managing budgets and deciding how money is spent
- Engaging with pupils, staff, parents and the school community
- Sitting on panels and making decisions about things like pupil exclusions and staff disciplinary
- Addressing a range of education issues within the school including disadvantaged pupils, pupils with special needs, staff workload and teacher recruitment
- Looking at data and evidence to ask questions and have challenging conversations about the school
- Appointing and performance reviewing the head teacher and senior leaders, including making decisions about pay

Skills

Anyone aged over 18 can be a governor and you do not need to be a parent. There is no requirement for you to have an understanding of the education system, just the necessary skills, character and time to contribute. There is plenty of training available to help you learn about education.

Schools needs and benefit from a range of professional knowledge on their governing board including education, finance, human resources, legal, marketing and public relations, property and estates management, and organisational change.

It is also important that you have time to commit to the role. School governors typically attend 6-12 meetings per year, as well as making school visits and having background reading and training.

Other specific questions for school to answer

You will also need to undertake a DBS check with the school and pass all relevant disqualification checks.






