What's happening in school?

Marine STEM session

On Wednesday, 20th March, Chestnut Class were lucky enough to have a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) workshop led by the Royal Navy as part of their outreach work to schools.

The children were very excited to fly drones, code spheros and create electrical circuits through their hands. They spent the morning having the chance to ask questions, play with the gadgets and find out more about STEM and the careers it could take them into.

In the village hall, the children were able to control some small drones and see if they could expertly fly them onto a mat. This was trickier than it looked as the children had to think of height, speed and control. The concentration of their faces was impressive.

Next, the children had the chance to create their own electrical circuits, running currents through their hands and making circuits to fly saucers. Many felt a slight tingle in their hands, but enjoyed the opportunity to test out some of their scientific knowledge.

The final activity was spheros, these are gyroscopic balls, which are controlled through an Ipad. This gave the children the chance to practice the coding they have been learning in class, as they made sure they could move their sphero around.

Hot Cross Bun

The bun marks the end of the Christian season of Lent and different parts of the hot cross bun have a certain meaning, including the cross representing the crucifixion of Jesus, the spices inside signifying the spices used to embalm him at his burial and sometimes also orange peel to reflect the bitterness of his time on the cross



Easter Eggs!

The egg itself became a symbol of the Resurrection. Just as Jesus rose from the tomb, the egg symbolized new life emerging from the eggshell.



Easter Garden in Catkins



Catkins have been finding out about the true meaning of Easter in their RE work this half term.

They spent one afternoon creating an Easter garden, which represents the crucifixion, burial and resurrection of Jesus.

Jaxen was able to explain why there were three crosses, while Billy explained the significance of the cave, as the place in which Jesus was buried.

The children also had a fantastic time, using the outdoor environment to find the elements of their Easter garden, before proudly displaying it in class.

Thought-full Workshops

Further to our letter about the Thought-full workshops for parents, here is a breakdown of each workshop. You do not need to attend them all and there will be opportunities for questions.

Session	Date	Theme
Session 1	23 rd April	The first session starts with understanding anxiety and introduces the biological function of anxiety. We also spend time getting to know each other, parents' experiences with their children and what they would like to gain from the workshops.
Session 2	30 th April	This session is one of two which focuses on supporting children with anxiety and worries. It explores what keeps anxiety going and the strategies that can be used to support children.
Session 3	7 th May	This is the second session on supporting children with anxiety and worries. There will be further discussion of approaches to support an anxious child including use of language and the PACE approach (playfulness, acceptance, curiosity and empathy), including some ideas about how parents can incorporate these areas into their daily life.
Session 4	14 th May	In this session we introduce emotion coaching which is a step-by-step approach in helping children to learn about emotions and how to deal with them.
Session 5	21 st May	In the final session we look at encouraging resilience. We explore how we can support anxious children to build their resilience and grow into adults who can cope with life's ups and downs. We bring the session to a close by reflecting on the workshops and next steps.

Safeguarding at Slindon

What is safeguarding?

Visitors coming on to school premises, including the playground, have a duty of care towards the welfare and safety of the children and adults in the school. This is called safeguarding.

Safeguarding means that:

- children are protected from maltreatment
- a child's health or development is protected
- children grow up with safe and effective care
- action is taken to ensure the best outcomes for all children

Safeguarding is the action we take to promote the welfare of children in our care to protect them from harm. We take this responsibility very seriously and we work in close partnership with parents and professionals to protect all of our children. The school will take any reasonable action to ensure the welfare and safety of its pupils is maintained.

Our staff and governors have been trained on safeguarding in line with the KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE IN EDUCATION document and have taken part in 'PREVENT'.
